Physical Development

A Unique Child- shows increasing control over an object in pushing, patting, throwing, catching or kicking it.

Positive Relationships-show children how to collaborate in throwing, rolling, fetching and receiving games, encouraging children to play with one another once their skills are sufficient.

Enabling Environments- plan activities where children can practice moving in different ways and at different speeds, balancing, target throwing, rolling, kicking and catching.

Literacy

A Unique Child- attempts to write their own name, or other names and words, using combinations of lines, circles and curves, or letter type shapes

Positive Relationships- model and include children in using signs and writing to expand playful experiences such as making signs for a shop or car wash, instructions for a ball game, a list of names for taking turns.

Enabling Environments- involve children when you make lists or write notes and messages.

Communication and Language

A Unique Child- uses talk to explain what is happening and anticipate what might happen next.

Positive Relationships- use a lot of statements and comments and fewer questions to build natural conversation. When you do ask a question, use an open question with many possible answers.

Enabling Environments- plan regular opportunities for children to speak

Understanding the World

A Unique Child- beginning to understand the effect their behavior can have on the environment

Positive Relationships- use conversation with children to extend their vocabulary to help them talk about their observations and to ask questions

Enabling Environments- teach skills and knowledge in the context of practical activities

Personal, Social and Emotional Development

A Unique Child-practises skills of assertion, negotiation and compromise and looks to supportive adult for help in resolving conflict with peers.

Positive Relationships- model key skills of empathy, negotiation, compromise and positive assertion when playing with children in your everyday interactions.

Enabling Environments- provide time, space and open-ended materials for children to collaborate with one another in different ways.

Expressive Arts and Design

A Unique Child- uses available resources to create props or creates imaginary ones to support play

Positive Relationships- co-create stories with children based on their ideas, experiences and the people places they know well or imaginary ones

Enabling Environments- offer children a wide variety of materials and resources, both inside and outside that simulate their imagination to build, to become, to represent and experiment with their imaginative play and thinking

A Unique Child- may enjoy making simple maps of familiar and imaginative environments, with landmarks

Positive Relationships- encourage children to make maps of routes they have walked or travelled in some way

Enabling Environments- plan opportunities for children to describe and recall familiar routes
