# An insight into PSHE/C within the Early Years at Glynwood



#### How does PSHE/C link to the Early Years Foundation Stage Profile?

## **Personal, Social and Emotional Development** - Self-Regulation Early Learning Goal

Children at expected level of development will: -Show an understating of their own feelings and those of others, and begin to regulate their behaviour accordingly; -Set and work towards simple goals, being able to wait for what they want and control their immediate impulses when appropriate; - Give focused attention to what the teacher says, responding appropriately even when engaged in activity, and show an ability to follow instructions involving several ideas or actions.

## **Personal, Social and Emotional Development** - Managing Self Early Learning Goal

Children at the expected level of development will: Be confident to try new activities and show independence, resilience and perseverance in the face of challenge; - Explain the reason for rules, know right from wrong and try to behave accordingly; - Manage their own basic hygiene and personal needs, including dressing, going to the toilet, and understanding the importance of healthy food choices.

## Personal, Social and Emotional Development - Building Relationships Early Learning Goal

Children at the expected level of development will: - Work and play co-operatively and take turns with others; - Form positive attachments to adults and friendships with peers; - Show sensitivity to their own and to others needs.

#### Physical Development - Gross Motor Skills

#### Early Learning Goal

Children at the expected level of development will: - Negotiate space and obstacles safely, with consideration for themselves and others.

### Understanding the World - People, Culture and Communities

Early Learning Goal

Children at the expected level of development will: Know some similarities and differences between different religious and cultural communities in this country, drawing on their experiences and what has been read in class; - Explain some similarities and differences between life in this country and life in other countries, drawing on knowledge from stories, non-fiction texts and- when appropriate - maps.

## How does PSHE/C look within the Early Years classrooms? These are some of the things you might see which link to PSHE/C.

- Children playing alongside one another, making conversation and sharing resources.
- ♥ Children exploring their own thoughts and ideas during 'planning' and 'review' times. These sessions are directed by adults to support the development of critical thinking skills.
- ♥ Children recreating familiar events in a role-play form. e.g. making cups of tea in the house area or putting the babies to bed.
- Children reading stories based around a range of family set-ups, different cultures and traditions.
- ▼ Adults encouraging children to make healthy choices. (fresh fruit is available each day)
- ♥ Adults giving verbal praise and encouragement to children to develop positive self-esteem and
